SINCE MY LAST ARTICLE IN SEPTEMBER, OUR LOCAL

has been hard at work ratifying collective bargaining agreements and expanding our Local to include four new additional units. I would like to officially welcome Wiebe Transport, Masterfeeds, Doughty Masonry and Flex-N-Gate to our historic Local. These units are now a part of the most powerful private sector union in Canada. I look forward to the challenge and replicate the success our units have been enjoying in your next round of negotiations.

### **TFT Global talks**

We have begun TFT negotiations recently. For those who do not know, TFT handles all the material handling, line-side delivery and sequencing of parts for the GM Truck Plant. This unit is 1000 members strong. Early talks have focused on cleaning up contract language from the original agreement. TFT is a non-union company, with its only unionized workforce here in Oshawa. The company has been served notice. We the union have full intention to implement language that respects our members and our rights. We have operated a certain way in Oshawa for decades and we are going to demand the company changes their past practice and commit to improving their labour relations in the future. We will not settle for anything less.

TFT members can rest assured, your Chair Deb Nichols and her committee have come to this table on a mission. TFT members have the full support and attention of Local 222 and together, we will win.

### **Generosity of GM Members Shown in Many Ways**

### IN AUGUST I MET WITH JP CLAUSEN, THE NEW EXECUTIVE

Vice President of Global Manufacturing and Sustainability. He was very Impressed with the plant and the membership. He had this to say,

"I'm incredibly impressed by the level of innovation and engagement at Oshawa. The team's capability, willingness, and ability to achieve targets are truly remarkable. I was especially excited to celebrate their recent achievement for their quality performance and JD Power Award for the HD Silverado. Your creativity has shone through, and I encourage you to continue delivering excellent results. With your "Can Do, Will Do" attitude, Oshawa has a bright future ahead. Keep up the great work!"

The Company has announced downtime for Jan. 2, 3 and the week of Jan. 5 -10, 2025 for automation projects. For those who qualify, Jan. 2 and 3 will be covered by Short Work Week benefits, with Jan. 5-10, 2025 as a layoff week. The Union will distribute Employment Insurance information and instructions before the Christmas break.

I was honoured as Unifor/GM Master Bargaining chair to be invited to CAMI bargaining negotiations in September. This was the first time the GM Master Bargaining chair attended CAMI bargaining. The bargaining team from Unifor Local 88 led by CAMI Plant Chairperson Mike Van Boekel worked tirelessly to bring a strong agreement back to their members. Many of the Ingersoll members have been on layoff for several years, and responded with an incredible 95.7% in favour to ratify the new two-year agreement. The two-year CAMI agreement patterns the three-year agreement negotiated by the Detroit 3 during 2023 bargaining. CAMI's two-year agreement expires on Sept. 20, 2026, which aligns them with our contract's expiry. For the first time since CAMI opened, they will bargain with the other Unifor-represented GM plants in Canada, which includes Local 199, 222, and 636. We welcome CAMI into the GM master bargaining group.

During 2023 bargaining I was successful in securing Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) training for our elected full-time reps. This past September our Union reps' attended this two-day MHFA training class taught by Ontario Shores. During the training they discussed the importance of prioritizing mental well-being within the Union, specifically designed to equip Union reps with the necessary skills and knowledge to help identify and address mental health issues among their members. The training covered a wide range of topics, including recognizing the signs and symptoms of common mental health disorders, providing initial support and reassurance, and referring individuals to appropriate professional help when needed.

The Union reps actively participated in various interactive exercises and role-playing scenarios, allowing them to practice their newly-acquired skills in a safe and supportive environment. They learned how to effectively communicate with individuals who may be experiencing mental health challenges, offering empathy, understanding, and encouragement. Additionally, the training emphasized the importance of self-care for Union reps themselves, as they often play a critical role in supporting their members' well-being.

By attending this MHFA training, Union reps demonstrated their commitment to promoting a supportive and

inclusive work environment. They recognize that mental health is just as important as physical health and that addressing mental health concerns can contribute to overall job satisfaction and productivity. The training also empowered Union reps to de-stigmatize mental health issues and create an atmosphere where individuals feel comfortable seeking help and support.

At the end of September, I attended Unifor Canadian Council held in Montreal. Delegates were officially welcomed by Unifor National President Lana Payne. Lana spoke and described the momentum workers, and the union, are experiencing right now as their "moment", with members feeling the motivation to push for better working conditions, fair wages and benefits.

"We did this together," said Lana. "I can't promise the moment will last, but I did promise that we would be there, leading our members, flexing our union muscle, and using the power we had when we had it. And so, we'll just keep doing that. So, let's go."

On Oct. 25, 2024, representatives from CAAT DB held an information session at the Local 222 Union Hall for all GM members in the CAAT DB plan. If you couldn't attend one of the sessions or have more questions, reach out to our Unifor/GM Benefit and Pension Representatives or contact CAAT DB.

### GM Members: Call for Your Union Rep Immediately if Your Job is Overloaded

### WITH THIS BEING THE LAST OSHAWORKER OF 2024, WE

would like to wish everyone a Merry Christmas, Happy Holidays, and a Happy New Year. We hope you enjoy your time off with your family and loved ones.

Job eliminations across the plant are driven by corporate greed. The responsibility to get rid of our work does not fall on our members' backs.

- Do not help the Company eliminate jobs.
- Follow your blue books.
- · Pull your Andon when you are getting behind.
- Do not do repairs in your station.

Members must place a call to your on-shift committeeperson immediately if your job is overloaded. We continue to meet weekly with management across the complex regarding ergonomic and job concerns.

GMS rotation is not a tool for the Company to fill absenteeism across the plant. If you are being moved to cover call-ins, please place a call immediately to your on-shift committeeperson. The Company must do everything possible to get Team Leaders offline. All jobs must be filled! The Company committed to this during 2023 bargaining with Unifor.

All calls must be placed by your Group Leader, not your Team Leader. Team Leaders are not management. Management has the responsibility to fix concerns on the floor-hold them accountable. Talk it out Tuesday on Facebook, sweaters and corporate propaganda do not fix problems across the plant.

The escalation process within the plant for Union Representation is important.

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### **GM Retirees: Understanding Your Travel Coverage**

**TRAVELING CAN BE EXCITING, BUT EMERGENCIES, ESPE**-cially health-related ones, can turn a dream trip into a nightmare-particularly in the USA, where medical costs can skyrocket. To protect yourself, it's essential to understand your travel coverage options.

### asrTrust's Travel Coverage for GM Retirees

All GM members, their spouses, and dependents enrolled in the asrTrust Retiree Benefits plan are covered for health emergencies while traveling outside their home province for up to 35 consecutive days. Importantly, there is no age limit for this benefit.

### What's Covered?

- Emergency hospital, surgical, and medical fees
- Emergency land and air ambulance services

Your coverage mirrors what your home province would provide in a similar emergency.

### What's Not Covered?

- Trip cancellation or interruption costs
- Uninsurable fees by law in your home province
- Private hospital room charges
- Repatriation of remains

Important Reminder: You must hold a valid provincial health card for the entire duration of your trip to be eligible for coverage.

### **Key Points to Consider**

- Travel Duration: You can travel for up to 35 consecutive days.
   Coverage expires on day 36 if you haven't returned home. You may take multiple trips, as long as you return home for at least 24 hours in between trips.
- Pre-existing Health Conditions: If you have known health conditions, they must be stable for 90 days prior to your trip departure date. "Stable" means no changes in medication or treatment, and no upcoming tests or procedures. For clarification of whether your health condition is stable, contact GreenShield Travel Assistance at 1-800-936-6226 before traveling. Even if you choose to travel with an unstable con-

dition, you will be covered for health emergencies that are not related to that specific condition in any way.

Traveling Beyond 35 Days: If you need to travel outside Canada for more than 35 consecutive days, consider the following insurance options:

- 1. Extended Travel Plan: This plan is only available to GM retirees who are within 60 days of their retirement. This annual plan adds an additional 30, 60, 90 or 150 days to your base 35 days of coverage without requiring medical underwriting. Premiums are adjusted annually. If you stop paying premiums or opt out of the plan, you will not be able to rejoin this plan in the future.
- 2. Individual Travel Policy: If you didn't opt for the extended plan when you retired, you can purchase an individual travel policy from GreenShield or other travel insurance providers. If purchasing from Greenshield, the insurance will start on day 36 of your travel, allowing you to retain travel insurance without interruption. A medical questionnaire will be required, and the premium is based on age and your trip duration.

Traveling Within Canada: If your trip is within Canada, your provincial health plan will cover most emergency medical costs, but ambulance services may not be included. It's wise to review your provincial coverage to determine if additional travel insurance is needed.

Being informed about your travel coverage can save you from unforeseen challenges while traveling. Always read the fine print of any insurance policy to fully understand your rights and responsibilities. We are finally starting to get new forklifts; many of you will find the new forklifts are slower. The speed is determined by the company. If there is not enough time to complete your job, tell your Area Lead. If you still have con-

cerns, contact your Union Health and Safety representative.

Always be sure to take the time to fill out your circle check. Just as important as circle checks, so are tug tests when connecting dollies and racks. Be sure to test each and everyone.

If anyone needs access through Gate 5, bring a doctor's note clearly stating the need to avoid stairs. You can give the note to Cyndi Turry, Deb Nichols



### AGS Members Advised to Wear PPE and Watch Out for Themselves

HELLO AGAIN EVERYONE. ANOTHER YEAR COMING TO AN

end and nothing much has changed here, production-wise. We are still having a lot of down days in the plating department. The press shop is basically the only consistent operation in the plant, mostly due to the higher demand of painted bumpers compared to chrome plated. We've experienced a fair number of optional Fridays with the odd layoff day. Obviously, this plant could use another bumper contract.

There are some positive signs. It seems there are contractors here on a regular basis. The company is in the midst of replacing 20 pumps in the plating line with more efficient pumps, generating at least an annual \$50K savings in electricity. The company has also invested heavily in the rebuild of our Draw Press. These are only two examples of the many investments taking place in this facility. The company will always play their cards close to their vest, and we will not likely be informed of any future product until after our 2026 Collective Agreement.

The company is putting a lot of focus on Health & Safety right now and will be making regular plant tours with a Health & Safety Rep. They will be documenting any inconsistencies, with PPE being the predominant focus. Meaning Personal Protective Equipment, safety glasses, safety boots, wrist protectors, gloves etc.

We all see safety violations on a regular basis, and some may feel they are being targeted. We've been pointing out the inconsistencies of discipline for the 10 years I have been with your union committee. Favouritism is not going to go away. Management's way of dealing with the favouritism, when addressed, is to inform the favoured employee that the union has pointed them out. This is purposely done to turn employees against the union. This is a battle we're not going to win, so the only one who can prevent you from a performance discipline is yourself. Wear your PPE, protect yourself, don't worry about the other guy, it' not going to change.

We've just completed the second window for early retirement options in this Collective Agreement. Unlike the first window, where surprisingly nobody took the option, four employees opted this year. Jamie Ferguson will be the first to go. Jamie started his employment in November 1981 and will have 43 years of service. Jamie's last official day will be Dec. 31, 2024. We all wish Jamie the best. The other three won't be retiring until Dec. 31, 2025. This only leaves 17 employees with the two unreduced options as well as the two 3% a year reduced option. These employees all range in ages from 61 to 64. In our next Collective Agreement, there will only be 12 employees left eligible for early retirement between 62 and 64 years of age. In the 2029 CA, there will be none.

We've been experiencing a lot of issues with our health care provider, of late. Employees are being denied coverage for things they've always been covered for or being charged more than they've always paid. If you are experiencing any of these issues, you can reach Brittany at ext. 6289 or myself at 6402. Don't just give up and accept the providers' response.





cheese and onion on a bun, also coffee for their men who were diligently working toward the union that was voted in at General Motors, Oshawa.

Auxiliary #27 started out at 37 1/2 Simcoe St. N., above the A&P store, where they had a fire and unfortunately some records were destroyed. In 1951 they moved into their new building, 44 Bond St. E. along with Local 222.

The aims and objectives of the Auxiliary were to education the women of automobile industry workers and wives of workers, in the principle and ideas of trade unionism.

In 1942 a soldiers committee was formed and were active in war affairs. Auxiliary #27 sent cigarettes every two months to members serving in our armed forces and also sent out Christmas parcels overseas.

Auxiliary #27 donated a fully-equipped mobile canteen to the Red Cross, also donated blood and worked in the blood clinics, also played an instrumental part in the Meals-on-Wheels program.

Auxiliary #27 had a very active five pin bowling league and participated in inter-area tournaments chaired by Sister Ethel Thomson.

We were very fortunate to move into 1425 Phillip Murray Ave along with our very supportive Local 222 and the Retirees Chapter. We continued to support our Local and many charities which we were able to continue to to the fact that over their 82 years, Local 222 had granted us exclusive catering rights in our halls.

It's been an honour to work with all the Sisters and Brothers that I have had the pleasure to know.

The involvement of Local 222 and Auxiliary #27 has proven that the trade union movement is not a self-interest group but a people movement.

Serving as Auxiliary President for several years, I got to know and work alongside so many senior officials of Local 222. Regardless of their individual caucus affiliation, I had the greatest rapport and understanding of all. It's always been a pleasure to serve with all over these several years.

I want to congratulate Sister Betty Rutherford who joined the Auxiliary in 1945 and celebrated her 100th birthday on June 14, 2024.

Congratulations also to Sister Viola Pilkey who joined the Auxiliary in 1963 and celebrated her 100th birthday on Aug. 2, 2024.

Thank you to all the Sisters over these several years for all your continued support, and to my dear friend Alice Gould, Bell Pioneers, for all your kindness.

### Politics, Policies and Economic Effects from Across the Border

#### WITH THE US ELECTION OF DONALD TRUMP AS THE

47th president many questions arise as to how his new administration will differ from his previous time in the White House and for Canadians, what will his election mean for Canada.

Given the recent appointments to his administration it would seem he is appointing those who have been loyal to him and are arguably further to the extreme political right. In many cases it appears that loyalty wins over qualifications for the jobs they are being appointed to.

For Canadians however one of the main concerns is how Trump's economic policies will affect our economy.

Trump campaigned on imposing a minimum 10% across-the-board import tariff. Canada exports 75% of its goods and services to the U.S. and Trump's threat of blanket 10% tariffs could significantly affect our economy. If he follows through on this campaign promise a Canadian Chamber of Commerce report suggests that would shrink the Canadian economy, resulting in around \$30 billion per year in economic costs.

Canadian economist Trevor Tombe, found the U.S. tariff and expected retaliatory tariffs from Canada and other countries, would have a significant impact on productivity, prices and incomes in both Canada and the United States. Tombe estimates that Trump's tariffs and reciprocal tariffs by Canada could cost Canadians \$1,100 per year in real annual income.

Sixteen Nobel Prize-winning economists have raised the alarm that Trump's policies will increase inflation which could result in a recession. The non-partisan Peterson Institute for International Economics, has stated that Trump's policies would drive consumer prices sharply higher two years into his second term. Peterson's analysis concluded that inflation, which would otherwise register 1.9% in 2026, would instead jump to between 6% and 9.3% if Trump's economic proposals were adopted.

There's an old saying that when the U.S. sneezes Canada catches a cold. Let us hope that this isn't the case when Trump takes power and his economic policies result in higher inflation, higher costs and a downturn in Canada's manufacturing sector as numerous economists are predicting.

In 2025, Ontarians and Canadians may head to the polls to elect new federal and provincial governments we must be vigilant to ensure that we do not elect right wing governments who will acquiesce to the demands of the Trump government and their policies which will have a negative impact on our country.

### - "It happened so suddenly" -

Many GM retirees and their families are prepared with their "final arrangements". However... many are not. Here is information to help when a GM member passes away.

The Union wants our members and their families to be as prepared as possible. Do these now:

### Practise using the GM Benefits Centre website www.gmcanadabenefits.com

If you haven't been online, update your security questions by calling 1-877-442-4625. Have your SIN and birthdate ready to punch into the phone system to speak with a representative.

☐ Confirm the next-of-kin address that GM has on record. All documents & forms are sent by Canada Post from GM (pensions), Green Shield (healthcare) and Sun Life (life insurance) to the address on file with GM.

We strongly recommend the Executor put at least one year's forward with Canada Post on the address of record to make sure all tax slips are received for the estate filing.

### ☐ Confirm name of spouse/beneficiary

☐ If applicable, confirm the surviving spouse pension amount. When a dependent spouse dies, the survivor spouse pension deduction is automatically stopped by GM.

**Special Note:** if the retiree had Out of Province **family** coverage through Green Shield, the family deduction will be changed to single coverage.

Confirm the life insurance amount. Remember it decreases with age. Special Note: Those who retired after 2016 have their basic amount decrease starting the month following retirement.

**Special Note:** When a retiree dies, there is no more Dependent Life insurance coverage.

### "My spouse did everything"

☐ Share the load. Make sure your spouse and/ or a trusted family member has the information detailed in this article.

Share your secure (not secret) place for SIN card and birth certificate with the trusted person.

Passwords. It's a new world. If your family wants to shut down your email, Facebook account, or switch the utility bills to the surviving spouse's name, they need your passwords.

### "It's all paperwork & grief"

For the initial notification, the Union needs a copy of the death certificate, plus the name & phone number of the person reporting the death. This information can be emailed to local222@local222. ca or faxed to the Union Hall at 905-436-9515.

The Service Reps at the Union Hall can help with the paperwork when it comes from GM Canada Benefits Centre, Green Shield and Sun Life.

**Everybody needs a current will.** Unifor Legal Services (905-433-4242 or toll-free 1-800-387-6592) prepares wills. Legal Services will ask for the member's GM badge number or GMIN. The Union Hall can look this up for you.

### "What about the Union death benefit"

Please note, there is no death benefit through the Union. This common myth is likely from a time when the Local helped process the federal CPP death benefit.

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
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
